Symposiums Lead Academy Agenda for 2025

May Life Insurance Investment Summit to Follow Spring Hill Visits

ITH 2025 ABOUT TO RING IN, the Academy is planning several public-policy external events next year across multiple practice areas. Two will be focused on sharing practical guidance and the exchange of insights for practitioners, and two are intended to facilitate engagement and discussions with some of the Academy's key external stakeholders and other thought leaders.

A May 22–23 "Insuring the Future: Insurance Investment Summit" in New York City will be hosted by the Life Practice Council (LPC) and the LPC's Investment Analysis Subcommittee. The summit will offer investment actuaries, asset managers, and other insurance investment executives working in life/pension risk transfer, health, and property/casualty a unique opportunity to network



with and hear from industry leaders, regulators, stakeholders, and peers on topics covering the rapidly evolving world of insurance asset management.

The summit will follow the Academy's annual federal "Hill visits" in early April. In 2025, Academy staff and volunteer leadership will meet with policymakers in Congress, federal agencies, and the new administration to discuss key policy issues across all five practice areas—property/casualty, health, life, retirement, and risk management & financial reporting. Set for April 2–4 in Washington, D.C., this will be the first year the LPC will participate, with an emphasis on issues related to reinsurance, insurance investments, and annuities.

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'Tales From the Dark Side' Webinar Examines ABCD Case Studies

HE POPULAR <u>Tales From the Dark Side</u> professionalism webinar series continued Dec. 6 with an interactive look at case studies inspired by matters that have come before the Actuarial Board for Counseling and Discipline (ABCD). Incoming ABCD Chairperson William Hines presented, along with incoming Vice Chairpersons Shawna Ackerman and April Choi. Academy General Counsel and Senior Director of Professionalism Brian Jackson moderated.

Hines gave an overview of the ABCD, followed by Choi discussing requests for guidance (RFGs). During discussion of an RFG focused on the applicability of the Code of Professional Conduct, she said, "Professional integrity covers not only actuarial work, but also all aspects of an actuary's behavior. We need to consider our responsibilities to the public and to uphold the reputation of the actuarial profession."

Several of the cases focused on qualifications. In response to a question about the U.S.-specific knowledge

requirement in the U.S. Qualification Standards (USQS), Hines clarified that requirement applies to any statements of actuarial opinion that are issued by the actuary and not just statutory

issued by the actuary, and not just statutory opinions. Ackerman presented several "mini RFGs," one of which polled the audience on whether a particular statement was a statement of actuarial opinion. During the discussion, she highlighted two useful resources for actuaries: Appendix 1 of the <u>USQS</u>, and <u>FAQs on the USQS</u>. (For more on the ABCD and RFGs, see "Professionalism Counts," p. 6.)

Other topics discussed include potential misuse of work product, continuing education requirements for retired actuaries, pressure from employers, and cooperation. The presenters wrapped up by encouraging actuaries to refer to key professionalism documents often, use the RFG process, talk to colleagues, and think about what is right in your dealings with others. Academy Hosts Sold-Out P/C Opinion-Writing Seminar

HE ACADEMY HOSTED a successful, sold-out <u>Seminar on Effective</u> <u>P/C Loss Reserve Opinions</u> Dec. 9–10 in New Orleans, covering the entire opinion-writing process from becoming qualified to signing opinions, adherence to actuarial standards of practice, and how to write reports. Attendees gained significant hours of continuing education (CE) credit, including professionalism and bias CE under the U.S. Qualification Standards.

New to the program this year were two-opinion writing workshop sessions, up from one previously; a new session on practice guidance that contained elements of documentation and report writing as well as how to read the annual P/C practice note; and a roundtable on updates to actuarial standard of practice (ASOP) No. 36, led by Michelle Iarkowski and Jim Leonard.

About a third of the audience were first-time seminar attendees, who gained valuable learning experience from both

Requests for Guidance: The ABCD Is Here to Help



AVE YOU EVER FOUND YOURSELF facing a professionalism issue that you weren't quite sure how to resolve and didn't want to discuss with your colleagues or boss? Perhaps you've been asked to do something you felt wasn't right. Maybe you were asked to take on a job you didn't feel qualified for or had an opportunity to take on a new role but weren't sure whether you were qualified. Or perhaps you have seen what appeared to be poor actuarial work, but weren't sure whether you should report it.

The Actuarial Board for Counseling and Discipline (ABCD) was set up to help in just these kinds of situations. Actuaries have a rare and valuable resource in the ABCD's request for guidance (RFG) process, which the architects of actuarial professionalism established to help prevent bad practice and thus the need for discipline.

The ABCD offers two types of guidance: Formal and informal. Formal guidance is issued by the entire ABCD in writing and is rare. (The ABCD has issued formal guidance only twice since its inception in 1992, both times on pension matters.)

Informal guidance is common. In fact, in the last few years, the ABCD has answered about 120 informal RFGs each year on a wide range of topics, including what constitutes actuarial services, qualifications for various types of opinions, actuarial standards of practice (ASOPs), communications, control of work product, duty to report potential violations of the Code of Professional Conduct, and many more. (For details, see the ABCD's <u>annual report</u>.)

So, what can you expect when you submit an RFG? First, you can start your RFG by contacting either the <u>ABCD office</u> or an individual ABCD <u>member</u>. If you contact the office, your initial point of contact will be the ABCD's legal counsel. In some cases,

he may be able to answer your question. If not, he will connect you to an ABCD member, who will reach out to you within a day or so. Apart from a brief summary that goes to all ABCD members, your conversation is confidential.

During your conversation, the ABCD member will likely look at your issue through the lens of the professionalism standards and walk you through the relevant parts of the <u>Code</u> <u>of Professional Conduct</u>, the <u>U.S. Qualification Standards</u> (and related <u>FAQs</u>), and the <u>ASOPs</u>. They may ask questions to elicit more information and raise issues you hadn't thought of. For the requesting actuary, the conversation is an opportunity to ask questions and get advice from an experienced colleague.

In many cases, the requesting actuary has thought long and hard about the problem before contacting the ABCD. Often, they've already come to a conclusion but would still like a sounding board to make sure.

So, when you have a professionalism issue and are not sure what to do, or you think you know what to do but would like to talk it through with another experienced actuary who is not involved in the situation, call the ABCD. They are here to help! \triangle
